- No matter where you are in Switzerland, you are never more than 15 miles (24 kilometers) away from a lake or a river.
- There are over 37,000 miles (60,000 kilometers) of signposted hiking trails in Switzerland.
- For American travelers, the Swiss franc often offers better value than the euro.
- Switzerland has been ranked highest in several recent sustainability studies, including the Environmental Performance Index conducted by Yale and Columbia Universities.
- More than 9,000 trains run daily on the approximately 1,860-mile (3,000-kilometer) network of the Swiss Federal Railways (SBB/CFF/FFS).
- Over 14 percent of Switzerland is protected. At a number of nature parks, you can experience the natural world in its raw and untouched form. Each park has its distinctive features, from geological majesty to rare, exquisite plants.

Engadin St. Moritz From the pristinely rustic to the elegantly chic, Switzerland's Southeast is an inviting collaboration between nature and man.

Allegra and welcome to a valley of stunning contrasts. From sparkling lakes to soaring peaks, St. Moritz boutiques and restaurants to a wealth of pretty villages, the Engadin is one of the world's top-rated destinations, according to November/December 2009 National Geographic Traveler magazine.

With an average of 322 sunny days a year, the Engadin Valley is an inviting playground dotted with iridescent blue lakes. You'll find some 360 miles (580 kilometers) of mountain and valley paths to explore on foot or by mountain bike. Be prepared for exhilaration: The Bernina Massif boasts the highest peaks in the Eastern Alps.

This majestic area will not disappoint those in search of nure mountain experiences coupled with some of the best hotels in the world. Also on tap are top-rated restaurants and world-class shops in St. Moritz. Another of its charms: The Engadin area is home to a varied cultural scene. Visit the Friedrich Nietzsche House in Sils to get a stunningly realistic insight into the famous philosopher's life, or admire the colorful paintings by Giovanni Segantini in a uniquely

designed museum sporting a large cupola. The Engadin St. Moritz region strikes a careful balance. It is a world-class destination that pays close attention to its natural resources, focusing on renewable energies and employing hydroelectric power. There is a Clean Energy Tour for visitors interested in finding out more about the valley's pioneering green efforts. A seamless public transportation system offers summer guests who stay in select hotels for at least two nights free use of local public transportation including cable cars.

Lucerne / Lake Lucerne Region Centrally located Lucerne and its surroundings hit the heights with peak panoramas and cultural performances.

The gateway to Central Switzerland, the city of Lucerne lies on the shores of Lake of Lucerne amid an impressive mountain panorama. Thanks to its central location, attractions, beautiful lakeside setting, and proximity to other fine destinations. Lucerne is an excellent starting point for journeys and excursions throughout Switzerland.

Whatever you expect from a unique city, Lucerne will not disappoint you. The museums, theaters, and festivals make Lucerne a city of culture that elegantly maintains a careful mix of traditions and trends. Lucerne is home to some of Switzerland's most famous landmarks such as the world-renowned Chapel Bridge and adjacent water tower. Yet, tradition and modernity stand side-by-side with ease in Lucerne, a city that has earned a reputation for innovative design. The futuristic Culture and Convention Center (KKL), designed by leading French architect Jean Nouvel, is one of many architectural highlights. Lucerne also plays host to many festivals throughout the year, including the Lucerne Festival, one of the major international classical music events.

Above Lucerne stands Mount Pilatus, where, according to legend, a dragon once lived. The best way to get acquainted with Mount Pilatus is by taking the steepest cog railway in the world (with a gradient of 48 percent). From hiking to biking, climbing to paragliding, Mount Pilatus offers plenty of summer fun. Several hiking paths lead around the mountain and offer a stunning panorama over six lakes and 73 mountain peaks. Plus you'll find Switzerland's longest summer toboggan run, a challenging 4,500 feet (1,372 meters) long with numerous twists and turns, promising fast fun with each run. A large rope park offers fun-filled outdoor adventure for everyone, with instructors who expertly guide vou from tree to tree.

Itinerary 1: A taste of authenticity

Switzerland has one of the most varied cuisines in the world, as well as magnificent wines. A culinary journey through four cultures and four languages awaits you.

Days 1-2 LAKE GENEVA REGION

Discover the wines of the UNESCO-labeled Lavaux Vineyard Terraces after you stroll along romantic footpaths that weave through the vinevards. Meet the winegrowers and share their passion. You won't want to miss such regional specialties as paper Vaudois (local sausage with leek and potato), sautéed fillets of perch, or unique cheeses such as L'Etivaz and Vacherin Mont d'Or.

On your way to Zermatt, stop at Europe's highest vineyard—the Visperterminen—where the spicy white-wine Heida grape grows. Walk along a vineyard trail and indulge in some wine-tasting. End your day with breathtaking views of the Matterhorn while you enjoy some typical fare: raclette, the roasted-chestnut dish called brisolée, or rye bread with air-dried beef.

DAYS 1-2


Days 4-5 ENGADIN ST. MORITZ

Travel on the Glacier Express train from Zermatt to St. Moritz, then work off some of those calories on the Via Gastronomica hiking trail (from Furtschellas to Val Fex). Afterward, dig into capuns (chard stuffed with meat and topped with cheese), plain in pigna (potatoes baked with salami), local traditional barley soup, and Engadin walnut cake.

Travel on the Palm Express to sunny Ticino, where southern charm and hospitality await you. The specialties of the region, such as polenta, risotto, and Merlot wine, are best experienced in an authentic "grotto"—a traditional tavern that was once a storage cave for cured meats and aged cheeses.

You can't leave Switzerland without having tried Zürcher geschnetzeltes with rösti, the classic preparation of sliced yeal in a fine cream sauce accompanied by a traditional grated-potato dish. For asty Swiss souvenirs, stop by Sprüngli for some chocolate truffles and filled macaroons called Luxemburgerli.


